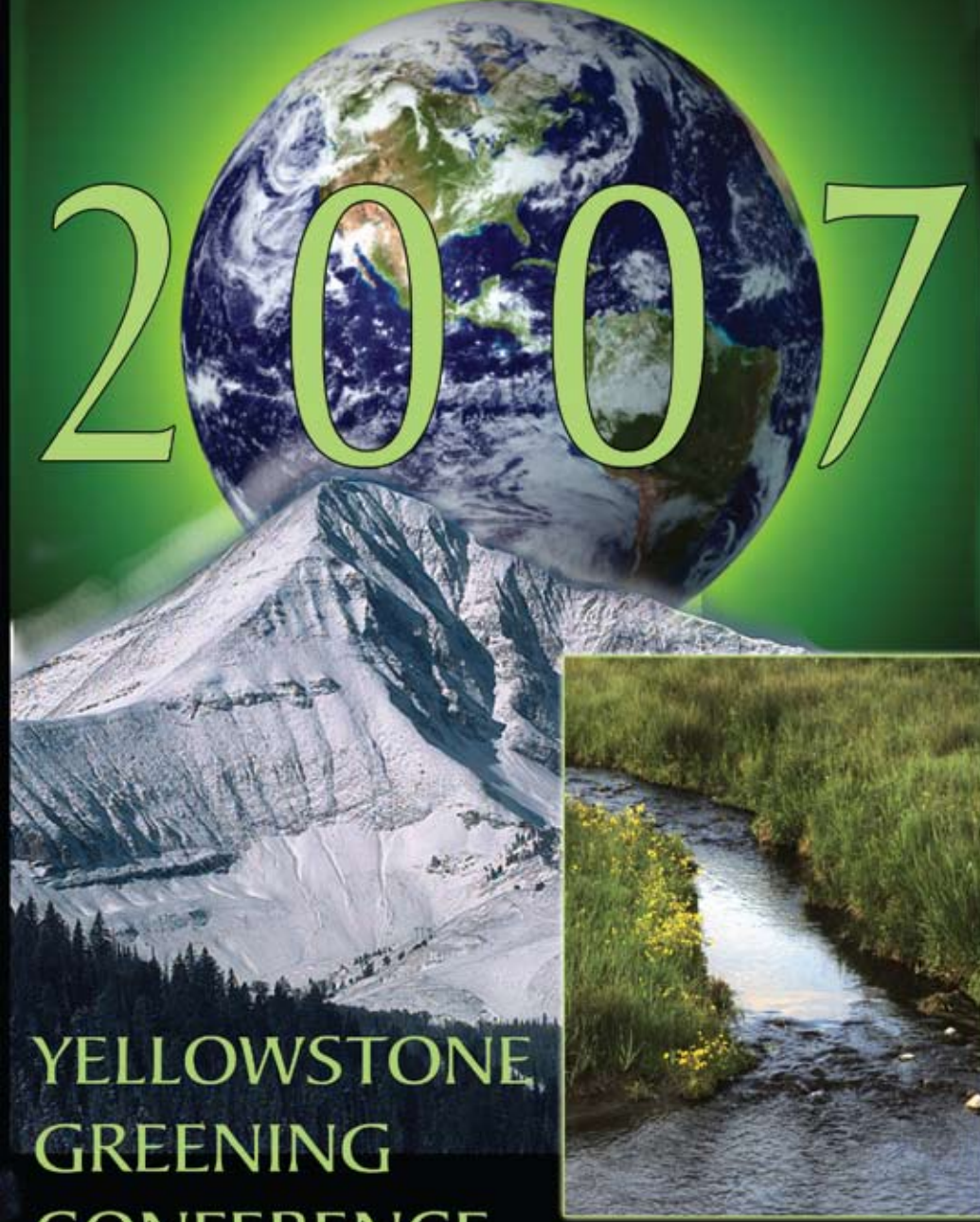

Daryl Hannah- Bio-diesel Activist and Actress

Most folks know Daryl Hannah as the blonde beauty who has starred in films like Splash and Blade Runner. What most people don't know is that in addition to being a sweetheart of the silver screen, Daryl is also an environmentalist whose roots run deep. For many years Daryl has lived simply using solar electricity, living in Tipis and utilizing the best green building materials and practices in the construction of her modest and rustic home. Daryl has been involved in the biodiesel movement for years and can be seen in the award winning film "French Fries to Go"

Dayna Baumeister- Biomimrcy

Biomimicry is an innovation method that seeks sustainable solutions by emulating nature's time-tested patterns and strategies, e.g., a solar cell inspired by a leaf. The goal is to create products, processes, and policies---new ways of living---that are well-adapted to life on earth over the long haul.

Eric Lombardi- Zero Waste Communities

Zero Waste is a new way of looking at our waste stream. Instead of seeing used materials as garbage in need of disposal, discards are seen as valuable resources. A pile of "trash" represents jobs, financial opportunity, and raw material for new products.

Lisa Skumatz - PAYT -Pay-As-You-Throw

Here's the idea: What if we were to charge for garbage collection in the same way we charge for electricity? The unit-based approach to garbage collection is called Pay-As-You-Throw (PAYT). Here's how it works. Once a "unit" is defined (for example, a typical 32-gallon trash can), each can of service costs the same. Throwing out two cans per week costs twice as much as throwing out one can. Five-can service costs five times as much as one-can service, and so on. This creates a financial incentive for households and rewards those who reduce waste and recycle - the less you throw out, the less you pay.

With our own Montanan 17% diversion goal looming ahead of us in 2008, the time has come for Montana communities to take a serious look at Pay-As-You-Throw as a waste reduction tool for the future. This is "must have" information for landfill managers, solid waste managers, public works directors, and county commissioners.
